

Blohm Und Voss BV138

The July Mystery Plane was the German Blohm Und Voss BV138.





After WWI ended, the Versailles Treaty prohibited Germany from building any war machinery – either army or navy. Germany, in the late grilling some brats and hotdogs and 20's ignored the treaty and started a small navy and airplane program. serving them with chips They were however 'passenger planes', not forbidden.

In 1933 Blohm Und Voss started developing a long-range flying boat. eating shortly thereafter. Originally plans were for 2, 3 and 4 engines. Prototypes were started in 1935 and the first prototype flew July 15, 1937. This was unstable in flight and had very poor water handling. The third prototype was meeting at 7:00 PM, and then plan abandoned and a complete redesign started. The new model had a much on continuing to fly until dark. larger hull, and heavily refigured with the gull wing abandoned for a straight wing and it now had 3 heavy-oil diesel engines. The planes, once the teething troubles were overcome were very successful aircraft. They were equipped with take-off rockets and at the Field' on Tuesday, August catapult capability where there was no water. A total of 227 were built.

The BV138 was usually powered with 3-880 horsepower, 12-cylinder vertically opposed diesel engines. It had a wingspan of 88 feet, a gross weight of 38,912 pounds and a speed of 177 mph. It had 4-20 mm cannon, 2-machine guns and 600 pounds of bombs and/or 4-330 pound depth charges.








Let's bring our models and set up a display in the parking lot at 5.15 PM before the meeting!


Let's see if a big crowd and display will get us in the paper!
