Pat flew on that Sunday and the snow on the field was pretty fluffy and he needed full flaps to keep on top of the snow during take-off even after packing down a make shift runway with the back of a shovel. Landing was a bit trickier with his glow ultra stick. Skis would drop in after 10 feet after touching down. The lighter electric mini stick did better on landings.

With the current weather forecast now at press time (it's raining a bunch!) the conditions at the field will obviously change considerably. This rain is supposed to continue into Friday before the temperature drops. This should put a nice crust on the snow, providing it's not too much rain and it washes away too much of the snow.

Plan on putting a pair of skis onto a plane or two and make a few trips to Jordan to enjoy winter flying. A

The club will keep the road plowed after the big snowfalls, so it should be pretty easy for members to get to the field and enjoy a Minnesota R/C winter.



Corner

Hello everyone! I hope you all had a very Merry Christmas and now are ready for a Happy New Year. A New Year – a new modeling challenge? A new modeling project? Trying something a little different? Well, why not?

I'm currently working on an old Byron (who?) 1/5-scale AT-6 Texan. Fiberglass fuselage, foam-core balsa-sheeted wings. Some materials that I haven't worked with before. The tail control surfaces (rudder and elevator) are balsa built-up and will be fabric covered and painted. I've done that before. For covering and finishing the fiberglass fuse, I'm going to try the Flite-metal process. The goal is to try and simulate a natural unpainted aluminum finish. Applying the Flite-metal tape to all the individual fuselage panels will take some time to accomplish. That will be a new challenge and also the retractable landing gear presents its own requirements. Air tank, operating valve, pneumatic lines, gear doors, etc. No matter which aircraft you select to model, they all seem to present any number of interesting features to try.

Programs: Who? What? Why? Where? When? How? Did I forget anything? We re-cycle some topics form year-to-year so if you were unable to attend one last year maybe you'll be able to catch this year's edition. In the spring we review our aircraft and radio systems and prepare for the summer flying season. We usually talk about floats and float flying somewhere in there too. Electric aircraft are very popular today and several of our club members are very experienced with this equipment. From off-the-shelf installations to custom designed battery/motor/speed controller set-ups, these are great reviews of how it all goes together. Kit building concerns from engines, accessories, covering and finishing demonstrations are as varied as the model makers themselves. Just a few topics to think about.

So whether it's a repair, a modification, working with new materials, or a new process, try tackling a new thing or two in 2011. Taking on a modeling challenge might just be your New Year's resolution.



Safety At The Field






Well here it is at year's end for 2010 -- the flying season is over but not forgotten. I have not been to the field of late but I hope everyone out there is following all the rules and having a great time.

January Program Preview Cockpits – A Model Within A Model

From lying on the lower wing of the Wright Flyer to returning to earth from the moon in the Apollo command module (basically the entire cockpit section of the Saturn V moon rocket) and everything in between; manned aerospace vehicles all share one thing in common. A place to manipulate the flight controls, operate the engine(s) as applicable and manage other various aircraft systems, etc. – the cockpit.

Obviously not required to operate or control our model aircraft, and not readily viewable on a lot of models, the presence of a cockpit from a basic cabin on a civilian aircraft to a detailed military fighter, provides a place for our pilots to do their job. When modeled with some detail and maybe accompanied with a pilot figure, the cockpit is definitely one feature that will draw some attention to your model. With the arrival of 2011 comes your opportunity to become an AMA All Season Flyer for the year.

To be an AMA All Season Flyer you must put an R/C airplane into the air outside in Minnesota at least once each month of a calendar year. The 'calendar year' are the operative words – which means you must start your year in January, not just go 12 consecutive months. TCRC has a huge tradition in qualifying all season flyers and there are several club members who have been doing this for over 15 straight years!

If you happen to look at your calendar, you will notice that it is now January. So get some skis on an airplane (it's easier with an electric) and get out to the Jordan field.

The club helps to qualify ASF pilots by scheduling one day per month in the winter for the flyers to get together. January 1st is scheduled as is February 5th. Now don't think that just because you missed January 1st, you can't qualify. There are still 30 other days in January to get the job done!


So, what are you waiting for? This is your year to become an AMA All Season Flyer. Get some skis on a plane and get ready for some great winter flying!

Chetverikov ARK-3

The December Mystery Plane was the Russian Chetverikov ARK-3




