

38th TCRC Auction Is February 8th

Saturday, February 8th is the 38th Annual TCRC Auction. That's just one month away! As it has been the last several years it will be held at CrossPoint Church at 98th Street and France Avenue in Bloomington. Doors open at 7:00 AM, registration starts at 8:00 AM, impound review at 9:00 AM and the first item goes onto the auction block precisely at 9:30 AM.

The auction is the biggest event of its kind in the upper Midwest and people come from the surrounding five states to sell items and to buy items.

If you are planning on selling a lot of items at the auction, or even just a few, webmaster Pat Dziuk has the registration program running on the club website, TCRCOnline.com. Using this pre-registration on the website is extremely helpful to the club and will help to lessen the congestion that occurs at the buyer and seller registration tables just in the doors of the church. President Bob and VP Mike both stress in their articles in this newsletter the very great need the club has in getting EVERY MEMBER possible to work at this event. And not just the members, but spouses, older children, and friends are also welcomed with open arms. If you have not already signed up to work the auction, we can use help at the buyer and seller registration, the impound area, the concessions, recording, cashier, moving products to and from the stage, spotters and clean-up -- just about everywhere. We will be reviewing all of the auction needs at the January 14th membership meeting, and will have a sign-up sheet available. Please don't miss this meeting!

If you are new to the auction, the general rules are that:

- Admission is \$4 for everyone
- All items are for R/C flying.
- Minimum opening bid is \$20
- Incremental bids are \$5 minimum
- Sellers can protect their item by being final bidder.
- Buybacks are 10% up to a maximum of \$20.
- Decisions of the auctioneer are final.

To help promote that buyers stay for the entire auction, the club will have some very nice door prizes that will be only for non-TCRC attenders, and those items will be given away after the last auction item has been sold. Winners must be present!

This is going to be another great auction, but only you can make it great by being there!

Be a worker, a buyer and a seller at the 38th Annual TCRC Auction on February 8th at CrossPoint Church in Bloomington. See you there! **J**

Some TCRC members work in excess of 16 hours including the Friday evening setup of tables and chairs, and organizing the concession and registration areas. The entire membership meeting in February is dedicated to planning for this event. Last year, some members could not even take a break because we were so short of volunteers.

If TCRC has another understaffed auction this year, it is possible we may decide to stop holding the event. It's not right that a few people have to work that many hours for the benefit of the rest. Corey will be in charge of the event again this year; please let him know when you can help. If you are new to the club, don't hesitate to step forward. We will teach you how to do a fun job!

Jim Cook and Conrad Naegele had a Twin Star at the meeting. Jim explained that he had picked this plane up at the TCRC auction a few years ago thinking it was a well-seasoned flyer. When he got around to getting it ready to fly, he discovered that the plane was really unflown and full of problems. He put two 25 OS LA engines in it and corrected the obvious problems and had it ready to fly at the Wisconsin Fun Fly last August. Expecting the worst Jim was surprised when it flew well on its maiden flight, but on landing approach it lost its port engine and ended up in a stand of trees. This fall Jim caught Conrad Naegele in a weak moment and persuaded him to repair the Twin Star. Conrad did exactly that and said that there were many hidden problems (like totally missing structural parts.) The plane now looks great and Jim is planning a new maiden flight in the spring.

Sherwood Heggen had an Electricus glider that he constructed from plans. He had previously built a

smaller powered glider which left much to be desired, so came the Electricus. He increased the wingspan from 74-inches to 80 inches. He covered it with red, white and black Monokote and put a small foldingpropeller motor on the nose. It weighed in at 1 pound 12 ounces and the maiden flight will be in the spring of 2014.

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Fokker T.1V

The December Mystery Plane was the German Fokker T.1V.



Aesthetically one of the most unattractive twin-engine float planes to see action during WWII, the T.1V stemmed from design work initiated in 1926, for a 4-seat torpedo bomber. Initially powered by 2-450 horsepower Lorraine-Dietrich W-type liquid-cooled engines, the prototype first flew June 27, 1927.

Of mixed construction, with a welded-tube rectangular fuselage, it had spruce and plywood wings with fabric control surfaces. From the start this plane was intended for use in the East Indies. A total of 12 aircraft were ordered. Despite the obsolescence of the design, 12 additional models were ordered in 1935. The new planes had a redesigned nose, in which the pilot and co-pilot were completely enclosed, and now had sliding glass windows. It was re-engined with Wright-Cyclone SR 1820 air-cooled radials. Also new were bow and dorsal gun emplacements. It was renamed T.1VA.

Despite the clumsy design the plane was exceptionally seaworthy, and very reliable. Pilots reported the plane comfortable and easy to fly. Still in service at the time of the Japanese invasion of the Java-Borneo area, no reports resulted as to the final disposition of the planes.

The Fokker T.1V was a two-seat recon float plane with a 48-foot 8inch wingspan and a weight of 5,622 pounds. I had a speed of 174 mph and an absolute ceiling of 33,300 feet. Its armament consisted of 2 7.9 mm machine guns. J

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All Season Flyer 2014 Kickoff Januae 4th


The intrepid pilots who are interested in becoming All Season Flyers in 2014 have Sunday, January 4th as the kickoff date to get started.

To become an All Season Flyer a pilot must put at least one flight on an airplane outside in each month of a calendar year. In Minnesota, those December, January and February flights can be occur in some pretty cool weather.

The 10-10-10 rule will be in effect on January 4th. That is, if at 10 AM, the temperature is 10 degrees or above and the wind is 10 mph or below, the event will occur.

If you are interested in becoming an All Season Flyer in 2014, plan on joining the pilots for their January flights. J

2014 AMA Dues Statements

All TCRC members should have received their 2014 dues statements in the mail in September from the Academy of Model Aeronautics.

AMA 2014 dues have not changed from the previous year. They are:

- Adult (19-65) \$58
- Senior (65 and up) \$48
- Under 19 \$1 or \$15 with *MA*
- Additional family \$30

Your AMA membership gives you \$2.5 million in personal liability coverage, \$25,000 in medical coverage and also a subscription to *Model Aviation* for the year.

To belong to TCRC, you must have a valid membership for the year in AMA.

Please note that AMA also has a Park Pilot membership that has a cost of \$29.95 per year, but that membership is not valid for membership in TCRC.

To renew your membership in AMA, the Academy gives you four methods: at the AMA website, <u>www.modelaircraft.org</u>; by fax at (765) 741-0057; by phone at (800) 435-9262; or by returning the renewal form you received in the mail in the supplied envelope.

Pay your 2014 AMA dues as soon as possible to avoid a lapse in membership services. J

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
