The buyers were allowed into the impound area for a half-hour and then precisely at 9:30 AM the first item went up on the auction block. Auctioneer Scott Anderson led off and from that time on, Scott, Jim Cook and Curtis Beaumont rotated as auctioneer and kept the action continuous until 5:00 PM when the last item was sold. When the dust settled, 440 R/C airplane items had been auctioned off at the rate of one item per minute!

Because of the length of the auction, the club had instituted a door prize drawing for the end of the auction, with the winners having to present to win. Warehouse, Sky Hobby, Hub Hobby and Control Freaks had donated 9 planes with a retail value of almost \$2,000 to be awarded to non-TCRC members who were still there. There were only 17 'buybacks' and 9 'no bids' during the course of the auction.

The many departments jumped into clean-up mode right after the last item was sold, and CrossPoint Church was pretty well back to its normal appearance by 7:30 PM.

Thanks to every member, spouse and friend that dug in to make the 2014 edition of the TCRC Auction a very successful one. Total results will be reviewed at the March 11th membership meeting.

Jafety At The Field

Well here it is the last day of February and it is for sure winter. It and Tim had been married for 13 seems it has been cold and been snowing forever!

I wish to take this time to refresh our memories and inform the new members about a few of the rules for field use. The club card or AMA card must be placed on the frequency board when you're at the field flying. In the pit area or in front of the starting stands your plane must be under physical control. After you reach the north bound taxiway you can taxi out without physical control (we do want you to announce your intension to take off and wait for, and answer, from others that may be flying). We try to use the runway so that you take off into the wind. (This may change as you fly, and upon approaching your landing you announce another runway direction if the wind has changed, but you must make sure that anyone else that may be flying understands the change). If the takeoff direction is to the east the circle direction would be counter clockwise. If takeoff direction is west the circle direction would be (you may have surmised) clockwise. Now after you land you may taxi to a taxiway and down it to about halfway where there is a line at which you cut your engine or take physical control to the starting stand or pit area.

If everyone complies with these rules accidents should not happen.

Now for you electric guys and myself included, when setting up or checking an electric plane on the bench you should REMOVE THE PROP before you turn on the transmitter as this can cause all papers and small objects to change places in the area and it sometimes cuts fingers as you stop the planes movement. How this happens is the unknown but believe me at can happen and hurt.

Now I was very happy to see the great manpower turnout at the auction. It was still a long day but with all the help I wasn't as tired as I have been at some previous auctions. Thanks to all for the help.

When flying always think safety, and keep the rubber or ski side down and any landing that you can fly again from is great but not always graceful.

- Senior (65 and up) \$48
- Under 19 \$1 or \$15 with **MA**
- Additional family \$30

Your AMA membership gives you \$2.5 million in personal liability coverage, \$25,000 in medical coverage and also a subscription to *Model Aviation* for the year.

To belong to TCRC, you must have a valid membership for the year in AMA.

Please note that AMA also has a Park Pilot membership that has a cost of \$29.95 per year, but that membership is not valid for membership in TCRC.



Miles Magister

The February Mystery Plane was the British Miles Magister.




The 'Magister' was the Royal Air Force's most important basic trainer at the outbreak of World War II. It was also important as the first monoplane trainer. Developed in 1936, it was based on the Hawk trainer which was none too good. Modes now included larger cockpits and blind flying equipment and included a hood over the rear cockpit.

This was a low-wing monoplane with a fixed but nicely faired tail wheel. All-wood construction held over from the twenties. It featured 'high' performance but no significant increase in landing speed. Deliveries to flying schools started in February 1937. To improve spin recovery the Mark II had a larger rudder – approximately 20% over the Mark I.

In production until 1941, a total of 1,293 were produced in England plus 100 more in Turkey. As World War II ended, large numbers of the Magister were released to civilian flying schools – now called the Hawk III. The Royal Air Force retired the last Magister in 1948.

The Magister used a deHaviland Gypsy Major inline, air-cooled engine that developed 130 horsepower. It had a wingspan of 33.3 feet, a weight of 1,900 pounds and a speed of 140 mph.

Remember, to be a member of TCRC you must be a member of AMA and supply proof of that membership at the time of your TCRC renewal.




The TCRC board also held the initiation fee for new members or members who had not paid their dues for the previous year. The initiation fee is \$75.
