TCRC Auction A Monster in Airplanes And Time

The 41st Annual TCRC Auction held on Saturday, February 4th broke and sellers. records for number of items and length of time. Doors opened at 6:30 AM and the auction action started at 9:00 AM. The last item to go on the auction block occurred at 6:15 PM!

On Friday evening, February 3rd, several TCRC'ers set up CrossPoint Church in preparation for the crowd the next day. That evening, 150 airplanes were already checked in and filled the main impound area room.

Early the next morning, more and more planes and equipment went off in a reco across the registration desk, and all of the impound area rooms were shattering the filled to overflowing. When the auction started at 9:00 AM, 616 items (the vast majority airplanes in one form or another) were ready for the **Continued C**

auction block, with an additional 50 items for the bargain table and 8 airplanes for the silent auction. That was a total of 674 items to be sold. The all-time high number of items from previous years was 540! It was obvious that this was going to be a long and tiring auction for TCRC'ers, but also for the bidders and sellers.

The auctioneers knew that they had to do everything in their power to move items as fast as possible, but still get all of the bids and fetch a reasonable price for every item. Veteran auctioneers Scott Anderson and Jim Cook (freshly arrived back from Arizona) were joined by novice auctioneer Brian Johnson. This was a true 'trial by fire' for Brian, and he acquitted himself quite well. When the dust had settled, the three auctioneers had moved 616 items across the auction block in 555 minutes, selling one item every 54 seconds! Not too shabby!

Right from the start everyone in attendance had access to the TCRC concession area, which started with donuts, cookies and coffee, progressed through hotdogs, chip and pop, and ended with Subway sandwiches. That crew was kept busy all day, and their efforts paid off in a record gross income, shattering the previous record by more than \$400!

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Bidder registration was brisk early on, with prospective buyers lined up out the main door.

Registration and impounding of airplanes and equipment was busy throughout the day. The guys managing the impound area had to cover a lot of territory, running planes from the storage rooms to the stage and back. Rick Smith had a Fitbit on during his impound work, and by the end of the day his steps were closing in on 30,000! That's about 15 miles of walking. Gerry Dunne's Fitbit was registering around 25,000 steps, while Jim Cook, not getting lots of steps during his auctioneer stints, logged in only 21,000 steps.

The TCRC members had turned out in force and the gray club shirts and blue club shirts could be seen everywhere. The organization for the auction was very well done, which helped the club achieve the record sales. But at the end, every auction worker was exhausted.

In an attempt to speed the auction up, items of lesser value were placed on the 'bargain table, with a price of \$20 to \$30 dollars. This worked well and 33 of the 50 items allocated to the table were sold.

The club also had a silent auction set up for 8 special airplanes. Two airplanes were on display at a time and the bidders had one hour to bid and re-bid on the items. This area accounted for the top 4 highest prices paid for an item. The highest price

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went for a Ziroli giant-scale SkyRaider, fetching a final bid of \$1,525! The next highest bid, also in the silent auction, was \$1,025 bid for a beautifully done giant-scale Top Flight P-51 Mustang.

With the auction slated to go 8 to 9 hours, the club had 10 nice airplane kits for door prizes, donated at very nice prices by Hobby Warehouse, Big Sky Hobby, Hub Hobby and Hobby Zone. These prizes could not be won by any TCRC member, and the winner had to be present to win. This was a very good incentive to keep plenty of bidders present at the end of the auction.

Total number of bidders was 240, with 44 of them being TCRC club members. There were bidders from out of state that make it an annual trek to the TCRC auction.

When the last item went over the auction block at 6:15, there was still plenty of work to be done. Crews went to work getting the carpets vacuumed, the tables and chairs put in their proper places, while bidder registration, impound, and cashier handled the transactions to get all of the buyers their items. The club again allowed credit cards, and this was very helpful to treasurer Tim Wirtz as he received payment for the items sold. There were a total of 40 items receiving no bid, 17 on the bargain table and 23 on the auction block.

TCRC will be hosting a pizza and pop party on Tuesday, February 7th, with prizes to help reward all of the members who worked so hard to make the auction a big success. **J**

TCRC needs a volunteer to become the club membership chairman.



Morane-Saulnier Type A-1

The February Mystery Plane was the Morane-Saulnier Type A-1.



The M. S. Aircraft Company was a prolific designer/builder of fighter aircraft in World War I, and on into the 1930's.

One plane in particular, was the Type 1, first flown in 1917. It was a monoplane, parasol-type, with the wing raised above the fuselage, braced by parallel struts from the outer wing to the landing gear. Typical rag and tube construction, it had 2 machine guns firing through the prop. Now, due to several structural failures and continuing engine problems, already been scheduled. It will be the A-1 was withdrawn from service in 1918.

While the A-1 was not successful, it did lead to improved planes, and Minnesota. the company produced more than 1,200 planes. Many of the improved there! planes were sold to other countries.

In 1928, a French pilot, Alfred Fronval looped an A-1 plane 1,100 times in 4 hours, 56 minutes!

The A-1 had a wingspan of 27 feet 11 inches, a weight of 1,431 pounds and a speed of 141 mph. It was powered by a LeRhone 9cylinder rotary engine that developed 150 horsepower.

We had 240 bidders. 44 of the bidders were TCRC members.



The TCRC board confirmed the initiation fee for new members or members who had not paid their dues for the previous year. The initiation fee is \$75.



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2017 AMA Dues Statements

All TCRC members should have received their 2017 dues statements in the mail last September from the Academy of Model Aeronautics.

AMA 2017 dues are the same as the previous year. They are:

- Adult (19-65) \$75
- Senior (65 and up) \$65
- Under 19 Free or \$15 with *MA*
- Additional family \$38

Your AMA membership gives \$25,000 in medical coverage and also a subscription to *Model Aviation* for the year.

To belong to TCRC, you must have a valid membership for the year in AMA.

Please note that AMA also has a Park Pilot membership that has a cost of \$38 per year, but that membership is not valid for membership in TCRC.



The new apparel is pretty nifty looking.


Club treasurer Tim Wirtz has been organizing the order of the club apparel and now has for sale:
