Hope to see you at the next membership meeting and the banquet on the 15th of November.







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Short 'Singapore' III

The October Mystery Plane was the British Short 'Singapore' III.



C'mon guys, fess up! When was the last time you saw a 4-engine biplane -- a 4-engine biplane flying boat?

The Short brothers design team did much to set the fashion in the flying boat field from the mid-20's to the mid-30's, and was largely responsible for Britain's pre-eminence in this type of aircraft. The Singapore was the last in a long line of Short Brothers flying boats. It was the production model of the Mark 2 which featured twin tandem power plants, triple fins and rudders (you can't have too much rudder!). The prototype flew in 1934. The first production model featured 4-530 horsepower Rolls-Royce Kestral engines.

Once assigned to squadron level this plane was of mixed construction, right on the cusp of primarily wood, metal and fabric to primarily allmetal (retaining fabric-covered ailerons, elevators, and rudders, which carried thru to past WWII). This was a warplane, so armament, including bombs, changed often. This easy flying, rather slow, plane

continued in service until the onset of WWII. A total of 37 boats were built, the last in July, 1937.

This 'general recon' coastal patrol flying boat had a wingspan of 90 feet, a speed of 145 mph, and a range of 1,000 miles. It carried a crew of 6 and for armament had 3 swiveling 303 cal. machine guns plus a 2,000 pound bomb load. J

For president, incumbent Bob Breisemeister has announced that he is running for a second term.


For vice president, incumbent Mike Robin has announced that he will not be running for a second term, and as of press time no member had announced his candidacy for this position.

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
