Safety Rt The Field

One of the rules that seems very obvious when one reads it is that all airplanes must have the name and address of its owner on it before flying. If it should fly away and is found or does damage to property it can be returned to the owner and/or damages settled without large problems for the hobby. In that regard right now we have one recently found airplane in the tractor shed with no info on it ??????

Some rules are just plain common sense. A good example of this is to do a thorough physical check of your model before flight so that all controls are working and in the proper direction. I would ask at this time to hold up your hand if this has at any time happened to you: You take off and up is down and right is left or any other combination of improper control. I would see a lot of hands in the air and one would be mine. Now sometimes you're lucky and you're able to land without total destruction of the plane, but other times not so lucky! Also loose screws or hinges are a common cause of plane re-kitting, when an easy preflight inspection would have caught the loose culprit! Checking a plane over takes only a minute or two at best, and that's a lot shorter than the time to build or re-build a model!

Last but not least I will close with a PERSONAL CONDUCT VOW FOR ALL OF US:

"I will always conduct myself in a responsible manner. Conscious that the maintenance of safety for others and myself rests with my ability to design and construct sound working models and to enthusiastically abide by the AMA and Club Safety Codes. I will abide by the decisions and follow the instructions of any designated person in charge or control of the session or event."

Enough said for this time! Keep 'em flying and land with the rubber side down.

Shooting Down a WWII Fighter Plane with a Handgun

In 1943, 2nd Lt. Owen J. Baggett of the US Army Air Force was deployed with the Tenth Air Force to India. At the time, Japan occupied Burma and threatened India. Lt. Baggett was the co-pilot of a B-24 bomber.

He was on a mission with the 7th Bomb Group to attack a Japanese position in Burma. His plane was heavily damaged by Japanese Mitsubishi A6M ("Zero") fighters. Lt. Baggett and his crew bailed out.

The Japanese pilots swung around, intent on killing the aircrew slowly descending to the ground on parachutes. A 1996 issue of <u>Air Force Magazine</u> describes what happens next:

"The Japanese pilots immediately strafing the surviving began crewmen, apparently killing some of grazing Lieutenant them and Baggett's arm. The pilot who had hit Baggett circled to finish him off or perhaps only to get a better look at his victim. Baggett pretended to be dead, hoping the Zero pilot would not fire again. In any event, the pilot opened his canopy and approached within feet of Baggett's chute, nose up and on the verge of a stall. Baggett, enraged by the strafing of his helpless crewmates, raised the .45 automatic concealed against his leg and fired four shots at the open cockpit. The Zero stalled and spun in."

Baggett made it to the ground safely, but was captured. He spent the next two years in a ghastly prisoner of war camp near Singapore. His captors had a measure of respect for him:

Shortly after he was imprisoned, Baggett, Jensen, and another officer were taken before a Japanese major general who was in charge of all POWs in the area and who subsequently was executed as a war criminal. Baggett appeared to be treated like a celebrity. He was offered the opportunity of and given instructions on how to do the "honorable thing"--commit hara-kiri-a proposal he declined.

The Japanese had found the body of the pilot that Baggett had killed. He was dead from a single gunshot wound to the head.

Baggett survived the horrors of Japanese captivity and returned to the United States. He later retired to San Antonio, Texas and lived to age of 85.

Show & Tell

Joe had a very nice looking OV-10 Bronco that he had built from a short kit done by Park Flyer Plastics. The plane had German markings and was done in light tan with orange trim. It had a balsa covered frame and Joe had gotten his colors using Sherwin Williams house paint. It had a 48-inch wingspan and weighed in at 4 pounds.

The Bronco was powered with two electric motors powered by two 2,100 mah 3-cell lipos. Joe had added electric retracts that he put together from Hobby King parts.

Joe said the maiden flight went quite well and the Bronco was a very nice flyer.



Bloch MB 157

The August Mystery Plane was the German Bloch MB 157.





This airplane was the last of a long line of fighters from the Bloch group. It was a singularly outstanding plane, deserving a fate far better than for which it was destined. The plane was all-metal, flush-riveted with fabric control surfaces, and was in partial production when Gnome-Rhone came out with a new engine, developing 1,700 horsepower, but larger than the current radial (the MB 156), so an entirely new airframe was made to accommodate the new engine. (Now it was the MB 157.)

Redesign went quickly, the new engine was installed. The 'new' plane called for 2-20mm cannon with 4-7.5mm machine guns. Just prior to flight tests, Germans approached Paris, the plane was loaded on a trailer, but was captured and sent to Bordeaux. The flight tests were extremely good. The plane was ordered to Orly, France, where it arrived 40 minutes ahead of its scheduled time! The engine was sent back to Germany; the plane stored and was destroyed in an Allied air raid.

The MB 157 was an extremely advanced fighter and possessed performance figures only obtained by the Allies during the closing days of WWII.

The Block MB 157 had a wingspan of 36-feet, a normal wartime load of 7,165 pounds and a maximum speed of 441 mph.


Special AMA Member Dues Offer

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
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bers. We need all of our members to start thinking now about running for office, or who they would like to see governing the club.
