It should be a great day to throw your cooler/lunch in the car with your plane and come spend the day with friends!




TCRC Fall Float Fly

Farman F-60 Goliath

The August Mystery Plane was the Farman F-60 Goliath.



A rather large passenger aircraft, the Goliath, first carried passengers in 1919. It was very cumbersome and presented a large frontal area.

The Goliath was of usual construction of the day but did employ the rather new use of welded steel tubing, and lots and lots of fabric. It did carry its passengers in some comfort, and it did set several altitude records (not great, but for 1919, rather amazing). On May 5, 1919, with 25 passengers, it reached 16,700 feet, in one hour and 15 minutes.

Originally, the Goliath had only one route, Paris to Casablanca. The trip took 18 hours and 25 minutes. The plane had a crew of eight.

These statistics are not terrific, but for just after WWI, are impressive. Imagine, 25 hours, no drinks, no stewardesses, not even peanuts!

The Goliath had a wingspan of 86 feet, 10 inches. It was powered by two Salmson 9-cylinder radials developing 260 horsepower. It had a speed of 75 mph and a range of 260 miles.






The TCRC Membership meeting on September 13th will be held at the Jordan Model Air Park.
