

# TCRC Planning To Make Land Swap

Club president Jay Bickford and Jim Cook have been meeting with TCRC's neighbor to the east of the runways and discussing the possibility of a land swap between the two parties.



The club is interested in the land to the east so that the willows can be kept under control and not block the runways. Roger is interested in the land to the north of the runways because it is better hunting land and adjoins his land to the north.

Club member Larry Couture is a registered surveyor and after he swap in the hope that everything can looked at the parcels he proposed the swap as detailed in the picture be completed by spring.

Jim Cook checked with the Scott County Planning Department to determine what would be needed to be done to meet county standards. The County stated that they would need legal descriptions of the two parcels as determined by the survey. Jim also checked with the Soil and Conservation Department since both parcels contain land that has been placed in the RIM (Reinvest in Minnesota) program. That department did not feel there would be any problem with the swap.

Also proposed in the swap would be a small triangle of land to the south that would border with the club's triangle. Currently some of this has been mowed and has been used for camping in the past.

The Scott County Planning Department felt that it would take approximately two months to get approval for the swap once the necessary legal descriptions have been submitted.

The TCRC Board is continuing to move forward with the proposed swap in the hope that everything can be completed by spring.



As always, lots of neat airplanes are showing up at the meetings.



Larry Couture had a neat electric float plane. This was an ARF called the Aventura Twin and sported two 400-size direct-drive electric engines. It was done with clear red Monokote on the wing and stabs, and with a white polystyrene fuse. It is not meant for cold weather with that fuse. The entire kit complete with motors and speed control was \$79.95 plus \$5.00 for shipping. Larry hasn't flown the plane yet although he said it floats well in the bathtub. First flight is scheduled for spring.



John Dietz had a Progressive Models P63 King Kobra that he built from the kit. John had originally purchased this for use with a .15 glow engine, but decided it would be great as an electric, so he put a 600-size electric in the airship. He covered it with light brown Monokote and added red stars and a red nose. He put 2-1/2 flights on the plane – the ½ being a crash that caused him to rebuild the front of the fuse. He switched to lithium batteries for more power and changed the engine to a more powerful electric. It has not flown with the new engine at this time but will very shortly.



Gerry Dunne had two planes at the December meeting – electrics of course! The first was a Great Planes Slinger – an ARF with a 400-size direct drive motor. It was done in white with red and blue trim. This he called a Zagi-type plane which is a flying wing. He has put about 20 flights on it in the first week and said that it flies quite well inverted.

Gerry also had another flying wing to show. It was a Hyperwing ARF and was done in blue, yellow and red. It was powered with a 380-size direct drive electric. The underside of the wing was predominately red while the top of the wing was predominately blue. This plane had not flown as yet but it is only a matter of time.


# TCRC Raffle Tickets To Be Mailed

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

### Fiat G-18-V

The December Mystery Plane was the Italian Fiat G-18-V.



In 1935, an airplane which can be considered the most advanced Italian aircraft of its day appeared – a type which could measure up to the modern contemporary international competition. This was the Fiat G-18, a twin-engined all-metal retractable-gear monoplane, which was in the same category as the then emerging Douglas DC-1, DC-2, and the world's greatest airplane, the DC-3. The Fiat was designed by Giussippe Gabrielli, who had been clearly strongly influenced by the Douglas aircraft.

For comparison, the DC-1 had flown in July, 1933, the DC-2 in May, 1934 and the Fiat in March, 1935. Its performance was very similar to the Douglas planes but in some instances was superior. Production was commenced with just two airplanes. The G-18 V series which had more powerful engines also had considerable structural changes and the V series first flew in March of 1937.

The entire production run was taken by Avio Lince Italiono. This aircraft proved a major contributory factor in the success of the European airline industry. By the Douglas and German Transport business, the total production of 9 airplanes was small, but it was a significant player in the 'golden age' of aviation, generally considered mid-20's to the mid 30's.

The Fiat G-18 V was powered by 2 Fiat A-80 18-cylinder air-cooled radial engines. It had a wingspan of 82 feet, a gross weight of 23,809 pounds and carried a crew of 2 with 18 passengers. It had a speed of 211 mph and a range of 1,025 miles.

Payment of dues can be sent to treasurer Bill Jennings at 20700 Huntington Way in Prior Lake, 55372, or paid to him at a membership meeting.


