Your AMA membership gives you \$2.5 million in personal liability coverage, \$25,000 in medical coverage and also a subscription to **Model Aviation** for the year.

To belong to TCRC, you must have a valid membership for the year in AMA.

Please note that AMA also has a Park Pilot membership that has a cost of \$29.95 per year, but that membership is not valid membership in TCRC.

To renew your membership in AMA, the Academy gives you four methods: at the AMA website, www.modelaircraft.org; by fax at (765) 741-0057; by phone at (800) 435-9262; or by returning the renewal form you received in the mail in the supplied envelope.

Deadline for paying your 2015 AMA dues is December 15 to avoid a lapse in membership services.


Treasurer Tim Wirtz has a number of TCRC logo shirts and hats for sale.

Safety and Field Rules

Well here it is the new year is almost upon us and the winter flying season has arrived. I just want all of you to make sure that you dress properly for the cold weather as you can get frostbite in a very short time without proper clothing on.

One of the field rules that seems very obvious when one reads it is that all airplanes must have the name and address of its owner on before flying. If it should fly away and is found or does damage to property it can be returned to owner or damages settled without large problems for the hobby.

I will always conduct myself in a responsible manner. Conscious that the maintenance of safety for others and myself rests with my ability to design and construct sound working models and to enthusiastically abide by the AMA and Club Safety Codes. I will abide by the decisions and follow the instructions of any designated person in charge or control of the session or event.

Now I want to see all members at the upcoming auction on February 7th as it takes all of us to make the auction run smooooothly.

Enough said for this time , keep em flying and land with the rubber side down. ${\bf J}$

A Plane That's A Car Who's Going To Model It First?

(Editor's Note: Below is the article as it appeared in the **Washington Post**. The obvious simple question for an R/C hobbyist is, "Who's Going To Be The First To Model It?")

Let's be honest: It's 2014, and the automotive industry has utterly disappointed a generation of science-fiction lovers and futurists. Where are our flying cars?





Stepping in the void is Terrafugia, which bills itself as 'the flying car company." It has announced an upcoming model called the "Transition", which sports foldable wings that let the vehicle go from car to plane in about 20 seconds with the flip of a switch. Talk about a convertible.

The upcoming Terrafugia Transition is not quite a flying Jetsons-esque car. The Terrafugia Transition is, more accurately, a plane you can drive rather than a car you can fly. That means you're not going to be able to hover away from a bad traffic jam.

But while it's unlikely that you'll see the plane/car combo replace the minivan, the company is trying to set an early standard for how regulators can deal with vehicles that operate both on the ground and in the air.

"It's a first practical step," said Terrafugia chief executive Carl Dietrich. "It's what we can do today with today's existing infrastructure."

From a regulation standpoint, Terrafugia has built in safety measures mandated by both the Federal Aviation Administration and the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration. So, for example, the Transition has both a parachute and airbags. To take care of the fact that it doesn't have a traditional rear windshield, the Transition has a camera in the back, allowing drivers to see what's behind them through a screen on the dash. No one wants to get into a lane-changing accident with a plane, after all. It also has all of the things you'd expect in a car, such as standard seatbelts and side-

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
TCRC Membership Report

view mirrors that can see around the massive wings when in car mode and can be removed altogether for flight.

Despite being street legal (with the wings up) the Transition is not exactly what you'd call a general purpose vehicle. To use both the flying and driving functions – and, if you're going to drop an anticipated \$279,000 on a vehicle, why wouldn't you? – you must have at least a sports pilot license.

You're also going to need a runway: The Transition still needs lots of room and a wide berth to take off, which it can do once it gets to a speed of about 70 mph. And that runway can't be just anywhere, because you can't just roll up to Reagan National Airport or Chicago's O'Hare and expect to

take off. You'll need to head instead to one of the nation's approximately 5,000 general aviation airports.

One thing you won't need, however, is a hanger. Wings folded, the Transition is roughly the size of a Cadillac Escalade or a Ford F-350, Terrafugia executives said. So it should fit in a standard single-car garage. It also runs on normal premium unleaded gasoline and gets roughly 35 miles to the gallon on the ground. In the air, it gets slightly less – about 20 miles to the gallon if you're flying at 100 mph.

The vehicle has a steering wheel for ground navigation, which pilot-drivers can then switch out for a steering stick in the air. It has four pedals on the ground – gas and brake pedals for driving and two rudder pedals for flying.


For the future, Terrafugia is planning a flying car that won't need a runway – but you'll have to wait a while. The development process alone for that model, called the TF-X, is expected to take 8 to 12 years.



Bel Geddes Flying Boat

The November Mystery Plane was the Bel Geddes Flying Boat.



Think "Monte Python's Flying Circus" and now for something completely different. This airplane was never built!

The brainchild of millionaire industrialist Norman Bel Geddes who pictured this plane as the answer to slow ocean going boats. On the eve of the 1929 Wall Street crash, Bel Geddes envisioned this gigantic flying boat. The design was fantastic, featuring a nearly 600-foot wingspan, 700 tons, propelled by twenty 1,900 horsepower engines. The plane was a tailless V-winged monoplane, all metal, to carry 600 passengers, plus a crew of 155. The pontoons were 235-feet long, 60-feet high, and 104-feet apart.

The plane featured a 250-foot dining room, a sport and recreational deck, 4 tennis courts, a gymnasium, a fully-staffed hospital, and a barber shop. The main promenade, on the leading edge of the wing, 450-feet long, provided full length windows, with shatter-proof glass, with 2 coffee shops seating 90 people. There were a total of 9 decks, plus a huge solarium!

The plan was to use all twenty engines for takeoff and cruise on twelve, providing nearly 50% safety margin. The negative aspect was its 90 mph cruising speed, taking almost all day to cross the Atlantic (but still faster than the ocean liners). The plans were reviewed by several leading aeronautical engineers, who pronounced it flyable.

Now, today's planes are rapidly approaching this plane's goals. Consider the 747's, the various Airbus's, and the fantastic Antonov AN-225, with a takeoff weight of 1.3 million pounds! A note: Bel Geddes was the father of Barbara Bel Geddes, the mother of J.R. and Bobby Ewing on the famous TV serial "Dallas". One question that occurs to me, is this a flying boat, or a float plane?

The Bel Geddes was to have a 528-foot wingspan, a gross weight of 1.4 million pounds, a speed of 90 mph and a range of 2,000 miles.

The engines were not known, but speced at 1,900 horsepower. I could find no such engines for 1929. A few examples were the Armstrong Siddelv Leopard at 1.000 horsepower, and the Rolls Royce 24-Vulture cylinder 1.845 at horsepower, but that was an inline engine! The large radials did not appear until the early to mid-30's. **J**

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
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
