The club purchased a new pull-behind mower deck for the New Holland tractor and it attracted a lot of interest at the August 12<sup>th</sup> Meeting at the Field.




Chief mechanic Doug Elyea shows off his new mower deck at the August meeting. (Photo by Jim Cook)



## Air Supremacy Over Goshen July 13-15, 2017

This was the 3<sup>rd</sup> event of the Warbirds and Classics Alliance 2017 calendar and it was being held in a new location! Previously the event was "Air Supremacy over Elkhart" for several years held at the Elkhart Municipal Airport. The change to the Goshen Municipal Airport (less than 20 miles away) gave attendees more flying time and more flexibility. The 1,800' Runway 5/23 allowed us to fly continuously while the main runway was being used by corporate jets and a flight training school.



This was an 11-12 hour drive from Eden Prairie so it took a day to get there. We were offered space in the circus tents and I shared space with such notable flyers as Greg Hahn, Brian Burcar and Kirk Hall. We had over 140 pilots and nearly 300 giant-scale aircraft topped off with Greg Hahn's Giant WWI giant-scale Italian Biplane Bomber with a 20-foot wingspan, and Carl Bachhuber's Constellation.

I had arrived with my newly maidened Seagull Models (SIG) Westland Lysander powered by a Saito FG60-R3 radial engine. This plane flew so well that I flew it constantly Thursday morning before the winds picked up. Mike Cox got some wonderful images of

my Lizzie on Thursday and Friday. I flew it again Friday morning then made a rookie mistake and lost it and made a new divot in the runway.

We had a number of pilots from the Minnesota Scale Flyers attend as well. Kirk Hall had mentored 12 year old Trace who flew a Balsa USA Sopwith Pup constantly and had won the BUSA Dawn Patrol Award for Saturday morning's dawn flights. Of all the pilots registered, Trace was one of 6 pilots 16 years old and younger. We did have a "Young Bucks" Flight where we had 3 12 year olds, (2) 14 year olds and (1) 16 year old pilots doing low passes with their giant scale spitfires, P51's and P47's. It was exciting to see!

With special thanks to Lee Watkins, Chuck Hamilton and all the support volunteers I plan to attend this event in 2018 again! It was well worth the drive!

NAMFI (or typically called 'Owatonna' by attendees) is our closest Giant-Scale Warbird event and is part of the Warbirds and Classics Alliance to promote the building and flying of radio controlled giant-scale warbirds and classic aircraft. A Classic Aircraft is typically defined as civilian aircraft design that is 50 years old or older. Warbirds can be of any era of manned military aircraft that meets the IMAA guidelines for giant-scale.

Balsa USA's Chad Asmus never stopped flying his 1/3<sup>rd</sup> Scale Piper TriPacer even after dark!




We had over a dozen turbine powered aircraft flying at Owatonna. This F16 was a huge hit as well as being a huge aircraft!

# Safety At The Field

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#### **Hawker Fury**

The August Mystery Plane was the Hawker Fury.



In 1927 Air Ministry called for a new all-metal radial-engined fighter plane. Hawker came up with such a plane, but extensive testing revealed Oct. 7 considerable shortcomings, and the plane, then called the Hart, failed to result in a contract.

Hawker then developed another similar fighter, as a private venture, but chose to use a liquid-cooled in-line engine, and scrapped the radial. It was considerably improved, made large use of flush riveting, fairly new at the time, but still used fabric in several places and fabric control surfaces. This plane was accepted for production. Renamed the Fury Mark 1, it was the first British fighter to achieve and maintain 200 mph! It featured spatted wheels, and was capable of using several different inline engines.

Standard armament was two machine guns, 303 rifle caliber, not much better than back in WWI! This plane was sold to a number of other countries. Production was purposely limited as the Brits were waiting for the new iconic Hawker 'Hurricane' which was just coming on line. Total production of the Fury is not known, but estimates are about 98. This plane was always considered to be one of the most 'elegant' of the then current fighter planes!

The final engine in the Fury was the Rolls-Royce Kestral 12-cylinder liquid-cooled, developing 640 horsepower. The wingspan was 30 feet, weight was 3,490 pounds and the top speed 200 mph.


